#### 1. Welcome

A welcome was extended to all leaders, parents and young people in attendance.

#### 2. Minutes of Last Meeting

#### 4. Treasurer's Report

Accounts for the period January-December 2016 are provided in the form of a balance sheet appended to this report. The group made a significant increase in expenditure over income

during 2016. This is in part due to one off exceptional costs and a slight reduction in membership numbers, but mainly due to increasing costs for; electricity, insurance and membership fees, payable to national Scout HQ for each member (this now accounts for 3 months of the subscription that you pay for each child).

To ensure that the group continuous to operate on a sound financial footing, the Group Executive and Leaders have made the decision to raise the annual group membership from **September 2017**, from £12.00 per month to £16.00 per month. This will be the first increase since 2013. We are continuing to work to ensure that the group provides Scouting that is accessible to all young people and provides a varied and exciting training programme.

Thanks to fundraising and donations by all members of the group, we have raised £112. In addition we have received £1,080 from HMRC in the form of Gift Aid on member's subscriptions; this will be an ongoing receipt each year as long as the scheme continues.

Each year members of the group are able to raise funds from schemes that their employers operate; this is in the form of matched fundraising from events that they organise, matched giving and one off donations. Our Chair Shirley Wilson has been in the forefront in this, benefiting the group by over £500.00 in 2016.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all parents of members who have provided support to the Group and to ask for your continued support. Scouting at this level is only possible because of the time and effort provided by leaders and supporters of the Group. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all Leaders, Members of the Group Executive and supporters for all of their time, thus enabling me to carry out the role of treasurer.

#### 5. Group Scout Leader's Report

Firstly many thanks to you all for being here this evening. You may not yet have had time to read the reports but when you do you will see that our leaders continue to offer a varied programme of activities each week and so provide good quality scouting.

The beaver scouts began after the last AGM with a new leadership team and one that has worked very well together. During 2016 they celebrated their 30 years of beaver scouting and had lots of fun doing so. You will see from their report that they are very active and are certainly putting the 'out' in scouting, they seem to be all over the place and miss out on nothing. Well done to the new team on completion of a successful year.

The cub scouts were also celebrating a special year in 2016, in their case 100 years. They have enjoyed an action packed year including a fantastic county camp with almost the whole pack attending. Like the other sections they also had a visit from the drumming group

which was a great activity and something a little different. I was most impressed by the performances from all of the sections. `Britain's got talent` eat your heart out!

The scout section continue to provide fun activities as well as honing their traditional scouting skills. I have sampled some of the food they have cooked on open fires, sometimes wrapped in cabbage leaves and tin foil and I have survived so they are obviously getting it right. Our congratulations to Sarah on the birth of rose Elizabeth and to Stephen on the birth of Emily June. The Nixon family are certainly doing their bit for recruitment. Sarah is on maternity leave at the moment but we look forward to welcoming her back very soon.

The explorer scout section continues to struggle with small numbers but continue to meet most weeks. They are taking part in the young leader training courses, which I am currently running for Meriden explorer scouts, and are a credit to us on these occasions. I just wished the m6 was not always blocked on our return journeys. To their parents I can only apologise for their late return home. Congratulations to them on winning the district founder's day quiz. They are now the proud caretakers of the toilet seat trophy for the next 12 months.

You will see from the treasurer's report that we are going to raise the membership subscription in September. We did not take this decision lightly but we do have to be realistic. Our outgoings are exceeding our income and we all know this cannot be sustained indefinitely. We have compared our membership fees with many other activities that our young people do and we still charge considerably less. We trust you will agree that scouting is extremely good value for money.

Our very small executive committee continue to work extremely hard on behalf of our group and we thank them for their efforts. They are currently working with the local council to negotiate a new lease. They are also researching various types of buildings which would be suitable to replace our current HQ and are worrying about how we will finance it. If you or anyone you know have knowledge or experience of serious fund raising, applying for grants etc., then any help or advice would be greatly appreciated.

I am sure you will agree our leaders are amazing. They give up hours of their time, spend endless amounts of money on fuel, exercise great patience, and attend numerous compulsory training courses, all in the name of scouting. We live in an age of ever new technologies, we are people dazzled by machines. However we must remember there is still no machine that can soothe a young person's fears, that can encourage them to do the task they think they can't do, that can help them have fun as a beaver scout, that can take them on their first cub scout camp, that can teach a scout to light a fire and cook a meal, that can help an explorer scout reach the summit of a tough mountain. Our leaders can do all of these things and they do, week after week, month after month, that is what makes them extraordinary people. I would like to take this opportunity of asking you to join me in saying thank you to all of them for the time and energy they give to helping to make our young people tomorrows special men and women. It is very sad to know that this was the last time we will be doing the Toy Service now that the church has closed down as so many past and present Cubs will remember the pride felt in doing the service.

Some members of the Cub Section represented the Group at the annual District Quiz in March. Although we didn't win the event, we came a very close third place with only four points separating us and the winners. The Cubs showed a wide range of general knowledge and really did themselves proud against some older teams. We need to get revising now ready for next year!

In April, some members of the group were lucky enough to attend the County STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) Day that was held in partnership with the RAF. Cubs had the chance to test their engineering skills by completing a series of challenges, including making the tallest helicopter landing pad and the best rocket. Again, the Cubs represented our group well and worked hard on their designs. Maybe we will have inspired the scientists and engineers of the future!

All of these events go on alongside the varied weekly programme that recently has involved visits to Holly Wood Nature Reserve to work on the Naturalist badge, first aid training, road safety and home help. This really shows the many opportunities and activities available through Scouting.

## Treasurer's Report 2017 Summary

 $1^{\rm st}$  Sandwell Scout Group is a registered charity, with all of its income derived from; charitable donations, gift aid reclaimed from HM Revenue and Customs, fundraising and membership subscriptions. There are no paid officers and all leaders and supporters provide their services on a voluntary basis.

The Scout Group as a trust owns the building, with the land being owned by Sandwell Metropolitan Borough Council and leased to the Group. The group is responsible for all maintenance and running costs associated with the building and the land, along with all costs associated with providing Scouting to its members. In addition the Group pays an annual subscription to the National Scout Association based on the number of members in the Group. The Group consists of 51 young members aging from 6 years to 18 years old and 27 leaders & executive members (2017 census return) (51 and 21 respectively 2016 census return). The youth membership of the group has remained the same during 2017.

The Group Executive Committee carries out management of the group's affairs. This committee consists of the Group Scout Leader and nominated and elected officers and nominated and elected members. All elected members are from parents of members and supporters of the Group. The executive committee members are also Trustees of the Group as required by the Charites Commission.

Accounts for the period January-December 2017 are provided in the form of a balance sheet appended to this report. The Group has a small operating surplus of income over expenditure for this period thanks mainly to fundraising activities; however, this can change as membership numbers fluctuate.

Thanks to fundraising and donations by all members of the group, we have raised £1,048. In addition we have received £1,103 from HMRC in the form of Gift Aid on member's subscriptions; this will be an ongoing receipt each year as long as the scheme continues. In addition, following a sponsored walk over Cannock Chase we were able to make a donation to Children in Need of £320.00.

Each year members of the group are able to raise funds from schemes that their employers operate; this is in the form of matched fundraising from events that they organise, matched giving and one off donations. Our Chair Shirley Wilson has been in the forefront in this, benefiting the group by £180.00 in 2017.

Last year the Group Executive took the decision to raise the annual membership subscription to from £12.00 to £16.00 per month. This was reviewed by the executive throughout the year and the decision was made to been put it on hold until September 2018; where the new membership subscription will now be £15.00/month, this will still be the first increase since 2013. A letter will be sent detailing our new Bank and payment details.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all parents of members who have provided support to the Group and to ask for your continued support. Scouting at this level is only possible because of the time and effort provided by leaders and supporters of the Group. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all Leaders, Members of the Group Executive and supporters for all of their time, thus enabling me to carry out the role of treasurer.
